



FACTS:

- 48% of population will assist an individual having a heart attack, 12% will help a trauma patient
- 314 people are shot daily, 41 are children. 95 people die daily, 6 of those are children
- 80% of mass casualty patients are delivered to medical facilities by non-ambulances
- There is 1 intentional mass casualty event a day

A person who is bleeding severely can die from blood loss within 5 minutes so it is important that bystanders take action. First be sure the scene is safe for you and the injured. **Call 911.** Here are some actions to take to help save a life:

The Stop the Bleed campaign was initiated by a federal emergency workshop convened by the National Security Council Staff, The White House. The purpose of the campaign is to build national consensus by better preparing the public to save lives by taking measures of first aiders to stop life-threatening bleeding following catastrophic events and incidents and reduce bleeding. Additional funds by military medicine and research to hemorrhage control during the next 100 years and to have defined the need of the military which supports innovation in technology to the convenience for the general public. Stop the Bleed is a registered service mark of the Department of Defense. Use of the equipment and the labeling does not guarantee that all bleeding will be stopped or that all lives will be saved.
